


Dear Parents and carers.

#### **Healthy Breakfast**

We looked carefully at how our cress had grown and noticed some had grown more than others. We thought about what we knew about things that grow and came up with some answers.




Annabelle said "it's had more sun and water so they have grown more."

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#### Year 4

Finally, the children have also engaged well in Art lessons to produce some pen and ink 'city scapes', based on New York City. All pupils generated excellent understanding of the key techniques, whilst also displaying lots of creativity and learning resilience.

#### Year 6

It is hard to believe that this will be the last term at Birley Spa Primary Academy for our current Year 6s. We have tried to make this last term the best by filling it with as many fun activities as possible.

In English we are using Robert Louis Stevenson's Treasure Island as a stimulus for writing. The children have already written some great character descriptions of the Captain and over the course of the next 2 weeks will be writing diary entries of his exciting journey to find buried treasure!

In Maths we have been learning about percentages. The children have learnt how to find percentages of amounts and how to convert fractions and decimals into percentages. We are also continuing to practise our arithmetic skills and as always, learn our times tables. The children will be completing a final set of mock SATs over the coming weeks, so continued practise of these skills is essential.

Our topic this term is called 'Is there a real treasure island out there?'. This topic is Geography based and links nicely with the European football competition taking place (which many of the children are excited about). The children will be learning about the world and how it is split up into continents, hemispheres, and time zones. They will also learn how to use an atlas and map to find certain locations and features. Please encourage your child to continue this learning at home by researching countries taking part in the Euros and presenting their findings as a poster or any other alternative way.

Finally, as you may already be aware, we are putting on an end of year production. Please help your child to learn their lines and enjoy listening to them singing along to the songs at home. Although we cannot invite people into school to watch this production, we are looking at ways to film it so you can enjoy it at home.
